- Has God ever challenged you by calling you to action toward a task or purpose you believed was too great and your heart became resistant toward Him?

(Hebrews 3:16)

- Among God's people could there be some who listen and understand the challenge in which people God face and yet become resistant and even oppositional to God's leadership?
- Can a small number of people among God's people cause a much greater number of people to become resistant toward God's leadership and challenge?
- Do all the people God brings out of bondage become resistant to the challenges He moves them toward?

(Hebrews 3:17)

- What kind of people was God displeased with for forty years?
- What does it mean to sin or miss the mark in one's relationship with God?
- Can a person miss the purpose of their relationship with God?
- Can a person fail to reach the freedom that a relationship with God should reveal?
- What are the consequences of those who sinned against or displeased God?

(Hebrews 3:18)

- Who did God promise that they would not enter into His finished work? Or His place of complete peace?
- Can belief only keep a person out of God's finished work?

(Hebrews 3:19)

- Can a person's beliefs become the barrier between him and God's accomplishments in and through his life?
- Do you really think God would not allow a person to enter into His place of complete peace just because of their belief?
