Hebrew 4:15

- How can Jesus being a high priest for believers seated at God's right hand have compassion upon us in our weaknesses and frailty?
- What does His compassion have to do with our confidence spoken of in Chapter 3:14?
- Do you believe Jesus was tested with everything exactly as we have been?
- Did Jesus ever miss the mark of freedom and purpose in life that God appointed for Him?
- Did Jesus ever commit an offense toward God?
- What does Jesus' position in Heaven mean to us after our sins have been forgiven?

- As a result of Jesus being the High Priest for believers, how are we to approach God's throne and what are we to approach God's throne for?
- Can you approach God's seat of power and authority with undoubting confidence in prayer with the freedom to speak frankly?
- When you approach God's throne in prayer do you sense you are approaching the place of favor and acceptance from God's desire to show loving kindness to you?
- When you approach God's throne in prayer do you sense or experience that He is giving you relief from the consequences of your weak state?
- Do you go before God's throne to obtain His loving and beneficial help in your time of need?
- Do you have a testimony of how Jesus as your High Priest who is seated at God's right hand has been a source of constant strength to you as a believer who deals with your weak condition on a daily basis?

How can Jesus who is seated in the heavens live within the believers by God's Holy Spirit?
